## History

 Former Region and the City of Greater Sudbury have been provincial and national leaders in responding to homelessness

Community planning began in 1993 with the formation of ACES – Advisory Committee on Emergency Shelters

# Research began in 2000 with yearly updates until 2003

 Provincial and Federal governments have provided financial assistance for homelessness since 1999 and 2000

## History (continued)

 City of Greater Sudbury began administering Federal Government's National Homelessness Initiative – Supporting Community Partnerships Initiative (SCPI) funding to agencies and organizations

Funding augmented by the City's Community Placement Target Fund (CPTF) Reserve

## OMSSA Emergency Shelters Task Force

Provincial per diems of \$42.95 are inadequate

 Many municipalities supplementing with 100% municipal dollars

More responsive service delivery and funding model is required

Final report to be completed in October

## Supporting Communities Partnerships Initiative

Greater Sudbury one of 61 communities across
 Canada

 Funding used for sheltering facilities, support facilities, support services, capacity building activities, public awareness

Local projects will end December 31, 2005

#### **Programs and Services Affected**

Four emergency shelters – \$560,998
Inner Sight Educational Homes
L'Association des jeunes de la rue
Elizabeth Fry Society
Salvation Army

\$42.95 Provincial per diems topped up by SCPI and CPTF

Nine community agencies providing outreach and support services - \$529,754



#### \$2,060,657 budget for homelessness initiatives

Combination of permanent and temporary funding sources.

## 2006

\$1,112,116 potentially available for emergency shelters and other homelessness initiatives

\$969,905 – \$775,924 from MCSS and \$193,981 City contribution for emergency shelters

\$142,211 – \$107,237 from MCSS and \$34,974 City contribution for outreach and support services

### Recommendations

- Request that the Federal government extend its commitment to funding of the National Homelessness Initiative;
- Request that the Provincial government increase per diems for emergency shelter beds;
- Request that the Provincial and Federal Governments develop a multi-sectoral strategy to prevent homelessness in conjunction with municipalities;

#### Recommendations (continued)

Continue City support and encouragement of community partners in their efforts to attain sustainability for programs that serve the homeless;

 Establish a Community Solution Team to prioritize services and supports within existing funding and budgets.
